Title: Right to have Intimate Privacy

Summary: Guarantees the Right that No Act of Sexual Intimacy Committed in Private between Consenting Adults shall be Prohibited or Discriminated Against by Law. Repeals Criminal Laws from the 1800's Banning Most Sex Acts between Married Couples, All Oral Sex Acts and All Sex Acts & Cohabitation between Unmarried Persons. Allows Legal Partnerships to take place between Unmarried Consenting Adults. Does not Repeal Laws Regulating Sexual Acts for Economic Compensation or Laws Banning Same Sex Marriages.

Full Text: Article I of the Florida Constitution is hereby amended by adding the following section. Right to have Intimate Privacy.

- A. No act of sexual intimacy committed in private between consenting persons above the age of majority shall be prohibited or discriminated against by law. The legislature is authorized to enact legislation establishing legal partnerships with full legal rights between unmarried consenting adults who desire to do so.
- B. Legislature can regulate sexual acts for economic compensation and the status of marriage.
- C. If any portion of this section is held invalid for any reason, the remaining portion of this section, to the fullest extent possible, shall be severed from the void portion and given the fullest possible force and application on the day after approval by the electorate. If the legislature does not pass legislation enacting legal partnerships between consenting adults within six months of approval by the electorate the Florida Supreme Court may order the legislature to do so or enact the laws themselves.
